




Richmond School House Museum Opens For The Summer

Located on a quiet area along Park Road in Brighton Township is the Richmond School. Upon entering the front door of this antique structure you will step back in time and experience the charm of another era. "The Richmond Little Red School House" was constructed in 1844 as a one-room school, typical of that time period. Imagine for a moment the year 1844. The Richmond School was constructed when only the 10th President of the United States, John Tyler, was serving in office. The population of the United States was only 19.7 million people and only 27 States existed in this country. The one-room schools in America characterized the rural lifestyle charm so prevalent of a bygone age.



Pure Americana. Incredibly, the Richmond School continued to help educate the Brighton Township community for the next 106 consecutive years! As America grew and education transitioned, the need for one-room schools diminished. Last used in 1950 as a formal classroom, "The Little Red School House," still educates and enlightens us in its modern day role as a first rate authentic one-room school house museum.

The Richmond School is located on Park Road and Grove Road in Brighton Township. Summer hours are 2 - 5 P.M. every Sunday, now through August. Also, group tours are welcome and can be arranged by calling Rich Pontillo, (724) 774-8292. Admission and parking are free.

Township Demonstrates Compliance with MS4 Program

NPDES Stormwater Permit Report Filed

Brighton Township has submitted its Annual Report to the Department of Environmental Protection for completion of the specified program requirements for the most recent permitting cycle. These requirements are part of the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4). The Township will continue to implement requirements of the MS4 program to protect water resources in the community. Among other things, the Township has done the items listed herein.

- Renewed its General Permit with the PA DEP for a period ending March 15, 2018.
- Distributes public education material to the residents and other applicable groups. This includes the When It Rains, It Drains brochure printed and distributed within the Township newsletter annually. A link to this publication is also maintained on the Township's web site.
- On February 10th the Township conducted a public education meeting on the MS4 program and the Township's implementation efforts.
- Participates in the placement of a storm-water display advertisement in the Beaver County Times newspaper titled "Protect Your Water." This is organized by the Beaver County Planning Commission for multi-municipal participants as a cost-sharing method.
- Public information material is made available on the Planning & Zoning Page of the Township's website.
- Provides for an annual tire collection.
- Has an adopt a roadway litter control



program in place. Contact the Township Manager for more information.

- A minimum of 25% of the Township's storm water outfalls are inspected annually for illicit discharges.
- Annual inspection of the storm water basin at the public works site and conducting all maintenance as needed.
- Adoption and enforcement of all provisions of the PA DEP's model storm water ordinance. Engineering review and approval of storm water management plans are required prior to approval of new developments.
- The Township continues to enforce Township ordinance by reviewing erosion and sediment control plans. The Township has also executed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Beaver County Conservation District for review and enforcement of erosion and sediment control measures.
- The Township has established procedures for municipal operations, including fueling and vehicle washing, to protect water resources.

Rental Registration Reminder

Brighton Township Code requires each owner of rental property located within the Township to register the rental property and the tenants age 18 and over. Thereafter, the registration is to be renewed on or before February 1st and August 1st of each year advising the Township of any changes in the occupancy.

The next semi-annual rental property registrations are due on or before August 1, 2014. Registration forms are available at the Municipal Building and on the Applications & Forms Page in the Resident's Center of the Township web page at www.brightontwp.org. It is the responsibility of the landlord to file in a timely manner. The Township does not send notices. If you have had no tenant changes, you may report the information by calling 724-774-4800. 2% Discount on Water & Sewer Charges Now Available!

Residential accounts can now receive a 2% discount on water and sewer charges by enrolling in the Automatic Bill Payment Option. With this payment option charges are automatically drawn from the enrolled checking account.

To initiate this service all you need to do is complete a simple enrollment form, provide a VOIDED check and deliver it via mail or drop-off to the Brighton Township Municipal Authority (BTMA) office at 1300 Brighton Road, Beaver, PA 15009. The forms are available in the Municipal Building or on the Water Sewage Authorities page of brightontwp.org.

Why do you want to do this? It is quick, convenient, a time saver and eliminates the need for postage or personal delivery. Plus, you will still get a bill card with the words "Do Not Pay" so you have an opportunity to review the charges in advance of when payments are drawn on the 20th of the month, or the next business day. Fire Hydrants Vital to Public Safety

The presence of fire hydrants are vital to the Fire Department when responding to calls. For this reason the Municipal Authority takes great care to make sure that each hydrant is highly visible and operational. As part of this commitment to the community each hydrant is operated at least annually, and more often in most cases, by the Authority. To make the hydrants easily identifiable by emergency response personnel, the Authority has marked each hydrant with a highly visible and reflective marker. In order to avoid limiting access to and the use of fire hydrants in the case of a fire or other emergency, Township Code prohibits obstructions to be planted, constructed or placed within six (6) feet of any fire hydrant. It is also unlawful for any person, other than those authorized by the Township, Fire Department or Municipal Authority, to open, tamper with or interfere in any manner with any fire hydrant.

You can help too by keeping fire hydrants located at your property clear of trees, shrubs or other vegetation. Remember, the Municipal Authority also needs clear access to water system operating components such as valves and curb boxes to properly maintain and operate the water system.

Baker International and Beaver Area Heritage Museum Embark on Historic Archive Project

Custody of Archive Entrusted to Museum for Cataloguing and Support of Baker's 75th Anniversary Celebration in 2015

Michael Baker International (Baker International) of Moon Township, Pa., and the Beaver Area Heritage Museum, located in Beaver, Pa., have announced a joint effort to collect, transfer and catalogue the entirety of Baker International's historic materials collection.

The collection consists of thousands of print photographs, photographic negatives, and 35mm slide photographs; 8mm and 16mm film on reels; project-specific microfiche dating to 1955; and internal and external company publications such as newsletters, magazines and technical journals. It also includes historical records as

well as reprints of industry trade articles that feature the company, highlight a company project, or celebrate employee achievements. Collection features include personal effects of the company's late Founder Michael Baker Jr., including his office desk, large globe, photo portrait, books from his personal library, and many other materials. Long-term plans for the cataloged collection include online Internet accessibility intended to serve academia and research.

Mark Miner, museum chair and a former Baker public relations executive said, "This effort represents an extraordinary opportunity to preserve a unique collection of technical expertise and document the signature accomplishments of both the Founder and the Baker organization which has deep roots in the Beaver County community. The project will help the museum expand its primary mission to educate students and others about our region's rich history, and will attract researchers and scholars to experience our remarkable collections and facilities."

Mildred Sefton, the museum's director of collections, and Charles Snitger, former museum chair and retired Baker architect will manage the collection archive project, with added support from a team of Baker retirees dedicated to preserving Baker's legacy for future generations.

- All containers labeled # 1-7 are accepted!
- Rinse, flatten and securely fasten cap back on.
- Labels do not need to be removed.
- Containers that originally held oil or chemicals must be completely emptied and not contain any potentially hazardous material
- No plastic bags or buckets.
- Place in green recycling container with other recycling items.

Aluminum, Bi-Metal & Tin Food and Beverage Containers and Aluminum Foil

- Rinse and flatten or crush containers.
- Labels do not need to be removed.
- Place in green recycling container with other recycling items.

Glass (Clear, Brown and Green Bottles and Jars)

- Rinse.
- Labels do not need to be removed.
- Do not break glass.
- Do not include auto glass, light bulbs, porcelain, ceramic, plate glass or crystal.
- Place in green recycling container with other recycling items.

Aseptic Containers (Milk Cartons)

- Rinse and flatten containers.
- Place in green recycling container with other recycling items.

Newspaper and Other Paper Products

- Include newspaper, magazines, phone books, junk mail, and all other paper.
- Do not place in plastic bags.
- Cereal and cracker type boxes can be included – remove inner bags or liners and flatten.
- Place directly in green recycling container with other recycling items.

Remember...

- Place your recycling container at roadside on the same day as your regular garbage collection during the recycling weeks.
- Place recyclables directly into recycling container. Do not place items in separate bags or they will not be collected.
- Recover your recycling container promptly after collection.
- Green recycling containers are available for purchase at the Brighton Township Municipal Building, 1300 Brighton Road.



2014 Tire Disposal Date Set for September 20th

The Township's annual Tire Collection program conducted in cooperation with the Independence Conservancy continues to be well attended, demonstrating the need for a continued method for the disposal of waste tires. Tires are excluded from the curbside refuse collection program. In 2013, 263 tires were collected. Since 2004, 2,951 tires have been collected at the Township's site. These are tires that may have otherwise been improperly disposed of.

This year's collection will be Saturday, September 20th from 9:00 A.M. to 12 Noon at the Public Works site, 1250 Brighton Road.

You can pay in cash or check (with proper ID). The collection is provided for individuals and small businesses, and there is no limit to the number of tires you may bring. Proof of residency is not required. Additional donations to Independence Conservancy are welcomed to help this non-profit organization's drive to eliminate illegal dumping and littering.

Adopt-A-Roadway Program

Numerous individuals and families have signed up volunteering their time and energy for our community. They are working to make a difference. How have they done this? By signing up for the Adopt-A-Roadway Program established by the Board of Supervisor to clean-up litter and improve the overall appearance of roadways. It is not too late for you and your family to become involved.

Under the program Township roads (or segments) are adopted by a volunteer group or family who collects litter on a Township road a minimum of two (2) times per year. We have even had one family adopt Dawson/Baker Fields under the program, and other parks are available too. The Township will

provide the installation and maintenance of permanent signs noting the program and the participant, bags for collection of litter and the collection and disposal of the bags of litter collected under the program. Participation in the program is subject to certain conditions and safety recommendations. "Litter Crew Ahead" signs are made available.

This is a great way for families and organizations to become involved in the community in a highly-visible and productive program. Refuse & Recycling Program New Rates Effective July 1, 2014

The fifth year of the refuse and recycling contract with J. Young Refuse begins July 1, 2014 with a collection rate of \$11.28 per month, or \$33.84 per quarter calculated as follows:

Cost Adjustment Items – During the term of this contract the rate per quarter per residential unit is adjusted for fuel cost adjustments on a semi-annual (6-month) basis or if there is an escalation in the fees charged by the landfill(s) utilized by the contracted hauler.

Please remember that additional fees are assessed for services other than curbside collection (backyard or at door service where specific contract restrictions apply) or streets that were not specified for curb service in the bid contract.

Mandatory Participation – Each residential unit is required to participate in the contracted refuse and recycling collection program. Brighton Township is also mandated by State law to provide curbside collection of recyclables to each residential unit. Township ordinance requires mandatory participation in these programs. As the contracted hauler provides the Township with the names and addresses of non-participants, notices will be sent. Continued non-participation can result in the filing of an enforcement notice with potential fines of not less than \$100 or more than \$600, plus costs of prosecution, for each violation.

Excluded Items – Contract specifications require the collection of rubbish and other bulky waste. Bulky waste includes appliances, furniture, furnishings, rugs/carpets (when cut in lengths of not more than 4-feet and placed in rolls), toilets, and other items. However, there are items excluded from collection. Following is a list of items excluded from curbside collection as part of the contract. However, this list should not be considered as a final complete list, as there is always the chance that an unforeseen circumstance or item has not been considered. Refuse should be placed for collection in bags not exceeding 40 pounds or 40 gallons in size.

Excluded items are: Tires, Yard Waste, Christmas Trees, Construction Debris, Vehicle Parts or Batteries, Paints, Liquids or Fluids and Hazardous Wastes. Loose debris must be in a box or bag. The contractor will not be required to pick-up loose debris. No steel or iron posts or rods that may damage garbage packers. Contractors are not expected to dismantle items placed out for collection. Items specified as items to be separated for recycling are not to be commingled with refuse for the purpose of being discarded.

Items containing Freon gas will not be picked up unless the gas or other cooling material has been properly removed in accordance with applicable laws and proof is provided to the collector.

Recycling – The collectors will continue to collect recycling curbside every other week. Residents are to use an easily identifiable green container for placement of the recycling. Holes should be placed in the bottom of the container for drainage. Recycling bins with lids are available for purchase at the Township Office for a cost of \$10.00. Recycling is mandatory under state law and enforceable by Township ordinance. Recyclable items that are prepared improperly, or are mixed with household refuse, will not be collected, or will be disposed of with the refuse. Each of you can help improve the success rate of the Township's recycling program.

Special Note: Please crush or flatten the large plastic containers. Otherwise they take up a lot of space and limit the volume of recycling that can be collected within the recycling truck.

Size and Weight of Recycling Containers Restricted – A special collection vehicle is used for the collection of recycling, which often requires the collector to lift the containers above their head to dump into the collection vehicle. Therefore, it is important that the recycling containers not be too large or too heavy. The recycling bins available for purchase at the Township Office are 20-gallons in size. If a larger container is being used it must not be filled or it could become too heavy and become a risk for injury to the collector. Please use multiple containers in this instance. Containers determined to be too heavy will not be collected.




Free Bus Trip for WWII & Korean War Veterans

Township Sets 2014 Road Paving Program



The Township has awarded the bid contract for the 2014 road paving program to Youngblood Paving. The total contract award is \$261,725. The streets identified for asphalt paving are listed below. The paving schedule has not yet been released, but advance notice will be provided through the Swift911 network.

The Road Department will also conduct their annual oil and chip program for the treatment and maintenance of certain roads to supplement the road paving program, as well as performing other important road maintenance and drainage projects.

The Township would like to thank the staff, teachers and administration of the Beaver Area School District for their support of, and participation in, the D.A.R.E. program at Dutch Ridge Elementary School. On June 3rd a year-end celebration was conducted with over 160 student participants, during which each student received a Certificate of Completion and D.A.R.E. T-shirt. The Rotary Club of Beaver provided financial support through a cash donation for the purchase of the T-shirts.

D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) is a nationally-recognized program that gives kids the skills they need to avoid involvement in drugs, gangs, and violence. D.A.R.E. is a police officer led series of classroom lessons that teach children how to resist peer pressure and live productive drug and violence-free lives. Sgt. Benedict is a certified D.A.R.E. training officer and teaches the curriculum at the Dutch Ridge Elementary School.

Delinquent Per Capita Taxes To Be Turned Over to Collection Agency

The Tax Collector has sent delinquency notices for all remaining unpaid 2013/14 per capita tax bills for those persons who have failed to make payment. The Per Capital Tax is an annual tax of \$15 (\$5 Brighton Township, \$10 Beaver Area School District) authorized by Act 511 and payable by each adult (18 years or older) residing in the Township. Current penalty amounts total \$16.50. Failure to pay the tax by June 30th results in the Township & School District turning over the listing of unpaid accounts to a professional collection agency for collection. Once turned over, the collection agency will attach additional fees for their services in pursuing collection, which range from additional notices, wage attachments and door-to-door visits. Fees can be substantial in nature.

The 2014 Brighton Township Real Estate Tax bills were mailed March 1, 2014. The 2014 Beaver Area School District Real Estate Tax Bills and 2014 Per Capita bills will be mailed July 1, 2014.

Hardy Field Update

The Township continues to move forward with plan design and specifications for the renovations planned for Hardy Field.

The first phase of improvements at Hardy Field, the ADA improvement phase is under construction. This phase includes sidewalks, access ramp and new stairs. The project is managed by the Beaver County Community Development Office as a result of a \$45,000 grant award for partial funding of the project.

The second phase of work includes a new baseball field, complete with backstop and fencing. A walking trail will circle the outfield fence and connect with the existing trail around the soccer fields. The contracts for this phase of work have been executed and should soon be under way. This phase is being partially funded with a \$100,000 recreation grant from PA DCNR.

The final phase of the project will be the redesign and construction of a parking area at the lower level, near the baseball field. The Township Engineer is preparing plans for submission to Penn D.O.T. to obtain the necessary Highway Occupancy Permit before the project can be finalized.

Last year the Township constructed a new storage and concession building to accommodate the soccer complex and the recently completed football field.

Sewer Deduct Meters Available


The Brighton Township Sewage Authority (BTSA), in cooperation with the Brighton Township Municipal Authority (BTMA), have made a program available to water customers to have a separate meter installed to measure the flow of water that does not enter the sanitary sewer system. This meter typically reads water used outside for watering lawns or gardens, washing vehicles or filling swimming pools. This sewer deduct meter is read at the same time as your water meter at the end of each quarter. The reading on the sewer meter is deducted from the excess use based on the water meter reading. The minimum amount billed during each quarter remains at twelve thousand gallons. Absent a sewer meter, no credit will be given for outside water use, such as filling your swimming pool or watering the lawn and garden.

The cost of the additional meter is one hundred & fifty dollars (\$150.00). This one-time charge includes the meter and installation. Payment in advance to BTMA is required. All inside plumbing revisions will be at the expense of the owner and are subject to inspection prior to meter installation. Applications for sewer meter installation are available within the Resident's Center on the Water & Sewage Authorities Page or the Application & Forms Page of the Township website www.brightontwp.org.

Municipal Authority Establishes Electronic Payment Service

Customer Assistance Needed for Success

For water and sewage customers using online banking we need your help. To begin in May, the Municipal Authority is establishing through their utility billing software provider a service that results in bank issued payments being made electronically. As a result, payments will be received much quicker, typically within a 24-hour period. For this to be successful we need customers to verify the accuracy of their Account Number when issuing payment through a bank. The Account Number is listed on the billing card.

The Payee Name should be one of the following:

What Are the Benefits?

Hundreds of customers have their water and sewage payments issued through on-line banking. Prior to this service, those payments were received by paper check through the mail, sometimes taking up to 10 days for receipt in the Municipal Building. With the new service, payments will be transferred electronically, much like other payments made with on-line banking to electric, gas or credit card companies.

The service benefits our water and sewer customers who can avoid late payment penalties through quicker payment application. It also benefits the Authority by eliminating the handling of paper checks and the steps associated with their processing.
