



Township to Prepare New Comprehensive Plan

The Township Supervisors and Planning Commission are in the process of selecting a professional planning consultant for the preparation of an Implementable Comprehensive Plan ("Plan"). The previous comprehensive plan was adopted in July 1999 and last updated in 2007. The plan preparation process will utilize the planning principals identified in the Pennsylvania Department of Community Development's (DCED) "Creating an Implementable Comprehensive Plan." This process is designed to focus on identifying community issues, steps to address the issues, persons or groups responsible for addressing the issues, and a timetable for implementation

that identifies short, medium, and long range efforts. The emphasis is on determining the needs and desires of the community rather than a fit into a traditional comprehensive plan format. There are two primary goals for the new Plan. First, to create a vision for the Township for the next 10 years based on the direction that citizens and various other stakeholders would like the Township to move towards. Second, to provide a series of realistic strategies, projects, programs, etc. that can be implemented to achieve this created vision.

Keep watch for more information on public meetings or community surveys that may be part of the planning process.

Leaf Waste Collection Program Returns This Fall

Drop Off Site Will Remain Operational

This fall the Township will provide a fee-based curbside collection program for leaf waste to comply with, and implement State regulations that mandate curbside recycling, including yard waste. The yard waste drop-off site will continue to operate on the same basis as it currently is and, therefore, participation in the curbside collection program is optional. Homeowners are encouraged to continue to use the drop-off site, or compost the leaves in their own yards.

The collection of leaves and yard waste is a fee-based program whereby residents purchase biodegradable paper collection bags at a cost of \$2.00 each within which the leaves, garden residues, shrubbery clippings or tree trimmings must be placed. Bags must be placed at the curb on collection days to be designated. Bags will be pre-sold at the Municipal Building. Bags utilized must be purchased from the Township, and not be from another source, such as a home improvement store.

Watch for newspaper announcements of the collection dates and when the leaf bags will be available for purchase.



Unauthorized Materials at Township Yard Waste Site

Unfortunately, unauthorized materials continue to be dumped into the Township yard waste site material bins. These types of materials (as seen in this photo) cause damage to the equipment and can create a hazard by being ejected from the cutting teeth and hammers. The Township has not increased the \$10 Annual Yard Waste Permit fee since first implemented nearly 20-years ago. However, maintenance expenses are increasing and are often related to equipment damage caused by persons disposing of metal, concrete and other unauthorized materials.

2019 Per Capita Tax

Berkheimer mailed the 2019 Per Capita Tax Billing for a July 1st delivery. The Per Capital Tax is an annual tax of \$15 (\$5 Brighton Township, \$10 Beaver Area School District) authorized by Act 511 and Act 679 and payable by each adult (18 years or older) residing in the Township.

Municipal Authority Payment Options 2019

Water & Sewage Payment Options

The Municipal and Sewage Authorities have options for prompt and quick payments of your water and sewage charges to help you avoid late fees or penalties that can occur as a result of delays that can occur with mail service.

Automatic Bill Payment Provides 2% Discount

Residential accounts receive a 2% discount on water and sewer charges when enrolling in the Automatic Bill Payment Option. With this payment option, charges are automatically drawn from the enrolled checking account. Your payment is never late with this option!

To initiate this service all you need to do is complete a simple enrollment form, provide a VOIDED check and deliver it via mail or drop-off to the Brighton Township Municipal Authority (BTMA) office at 1300 Brighton Road, Beaver, PA 15009. The forms are available in the Municipal Building or on the Water/Sewage Authorities Page of www.brightontwp.org.

It is quick, convenient, a time saver and eliminates the need for postage or personal delivery. Plus, you will still get a bill card with the words "Do Not Pay" so you have an opportunity to review the charges in advance of when payments are drawn on the 20th of the month, or the next business day.

E-Mail Billing

Electronic Payment Service

Payments utilizing on-line banking results in bank issued payments made electronically. As a result, payments are received much quicker, typically within a 24-hour period, but not guaranteed by the bank. Please verify the accuracy of your Account Number when issuing payment through a bank. The Account Number is listed on the billing card.

Using an incorrect Account Number or Payee Name could result in the payment being rejected for electronic service.

Township MS4 Permit Activities

Annual tasks continue for compliance with the requirements of the Township's MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) Permit, as the Township prepares to submit its annual Progress Report to the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) in September. Throughout the course of the year the Township has completed reviews of infrastructure throughout the Township to meet the water quality goals of its permit.

Annual outfall screening is complete for 2019. Twenty percent (20%) of the Township outfalls, or stormwater discharge locations, were reviewed to evaluate for the presence of contaminants or pollutants. Discharges from the Township's storm sewers should be free of pollutants such as chemicals, detergents, and bacteria. Some of the outfalls screened this year contained small concentrations of contaminants, most commonly detergents. Additional investigation will occur to determine point sources of any contaminants. Residents that implement good pollution prevention practices can create a

significant impact on water quality by limiting discharge of pollutants, especially during outdoor activities through the summer months. Some examples of pollution prevention practices are as follows:

Washing Cars – When washing vehicles, consider the destination of runoff of wash water. Wash water contains a variety of harmful contaminants, including soaps and cleaning agents, along with the dirt, debris, oils and greases removed from the vehicle. Washing should be done such that wash water does not reach the storm sewers or streams. Using commercial car washes is the best solution, as wash water is treated and recycled. If washing at home, wash on a grass area or other surface where wash water can permeate or infiltrate into the ground.

Lawn Care – When working on your yard, consider the final destination of yard waste. When possible, compost or mulch yard waste. Never sweep or deposit grass clippings into the street, storm drains or along streams. Yard waste contributes nutrients to surface waters that degrade the environment for wildlife. When fertilizing, be careful to avoid over application and never fertilize before it rains. Runoff will carry chemicals and nutrients from the fertilizer to the MS4 and streams.

Pet Waste – Cleaning up after your pet at home and when walking through the neighborhood or parks is key to helping water quality. When waste is left on the ground, stormwater runoff can carry bacteria, pathogens and nutrients to our streams, again impacting the quality of our drinking water sources. Ideally, pet waste should be flushed or disposed of in the garbage. Waste may never be deposited into a storm drain.

Swimming Pools – Chlorinated water from swimming pools cannot be discharged to the MS4 or to a stream. PADEP recommends two options for emptying swimming pools. Discharge should be completed such that it may permeate into the ground, rather than flowing overland to a stream or the MS4.

In addition to the Township's typical annual compliance tasks, design is underway for the initial improvements to be constructed as part of the Township's Pollutant Reduction Plan. As part of the Township's renewal of its MS4 Permit for 2018, PADEP required development of a Pollutant Reduction Plan outlining a series of projects to create stormwater management facilities (Best Management Practices, or BMPs) to remove sediment, a significant pollutant, from stormwater prior to discharge to the streams and lakes receiving runoff within the Township. The initial project currently in design includes the restoration and retrofit of an existing stormwater detention basin to include filtration media to remove sediment from collected stormwater prior to discharge to the receiving streams. The project is planned to be bid for construction to begin in Fall 2019. The Township must continue to implement stormwater quality improvements identified in the Pollutant Reduction Plan to meet pollutant reduction goals by March 2023 for the current permit cycle.



Stormwater Service Fee Delinquent Collections

Stormwater Service Fee bills that were mailed at the beginning of February by Berkheimer are now in the penalty period for collection.

Delinquent notices will be sent by Berkheimer for unpaid accounts. Billings that are unpaid by December 1st will enter into the delinquent collection program. The unpaid balance will be filed as a lien upon the property and incur additional fees and interest until paid. The Lien Preparation & Filing Fee is \$50. Liens will accrue interest at a rate of 6% per year. The Lien Satisfaction Fee is \$25.

As reported in prior newsletters, the Township adopted a Stormwater Service Fee effective in 2019. Bills were mailed at the beginning of February by Berkheimer, who was selected as the most cost effective method for billing. The rate is

established at \$66.00 per year (\$5.50 per month) for each single-family detached residential property. The billing provided discount, face and penalty periods. Developments that own and maintain their own stormwater infrastructure, and are part of the Township's inspection and maintenance program may be eligible for a partial credit. The fee unit is identified as an Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU). An ERU is designated as 4,700 SF of impervious surfaces based upon the Township's Stormwater Service Fee Analysis and Report. Non-single family properties pay fees based upon how many ERUs their property has.

Stormwater is now highly regulated. Requirements of the Township's NPDES General Permit for its Stormwater Discharges from Small Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4) as issued by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) necessitates frequent inspection, maintenance and quality monitoring, similar to water, sewage or other utilities. Costs for these activities continue to increase as a result of regulatory requirements. As a result, the Township has become more proactive with the maintenance of existing storm sewer systems and site inspections. The Township will be investing in new infrastructure and site improvements that are necessary for regulatory compliance and to implement the requirements of the approved Pollutant Reduction Plan.




Sewage Authority Completes Sewer Line Bursting and Slip Lining Project

The Brighton Township Sewage Authority has completed a phase of sanitary sewer line bursting and slip lining this summer on sections of Walnut Street and Maple Drive. The project included approximately 1,354 LF of 8-inch pipe bursting and slip lining. This required the reconnection of 23 house laterals. An opportunity was provided to homeowners within the project area to have their house laterals fully replaced utilizing the slip lining method under contract prices on a reimbursable basis. The total project cost was \$162,734.

The sewer lines in this area are the oldest in the collection system and were constructed with vitrified clay pipe. This type of pipe is more susceptible to root and water infiltration at the numerous joints, or through

cracks that develop over time. The goal of the project is to eliminate areas of possible ground water infiltration or surface water inflow into the sanitary sewer system by inserting the continuous HDPE sewer lining. House laterals are also considered a primary source of groundwater infiltration. Charges for sewage treatment by the Vanport Township Municipal Authority are based upon total flows into the treatment facility. Elimination of non-sewage flows reduces overall treatment expenses, reduces pump station operational expenses, and maintains capacity within the system for additional sewage connections and flows.

In addition, the Authority operators annually conduct a sewer line flushing program that includes inspection of




A new HDPE pipe is pulled through the existing sewer line, bursting the old clay pipe as it pulled from one manhole to the next.

manholes within the system for possible cleaning and sealing if identified as possible sources of groundwater infiltration. Sewer lines are also inspected utilizing CCTV equipment which can identify trouble spots such as cracked or broken pipe or offset joints. These methods are utilized to identify future project areas.

Township Prepares for Winter Road Maintenance

The winter season is quickly approaching! The following reminders are provided so you may assist us this winter.



Township Ordinance regarding snow removal does prohibit parking, or allowing to be parked, any motor vehicle or other vehicle on any public street within the Township following the deposit or accumulation of ice or snow of three (3) inches or greater in depth, until the snow has been completely plowed from the full width of the roadway. Violators are subject to a \$15 fine when ticketed by the Police Department, or towing when necessary.



Do not shovel snow into the road or have your driveway plowed into the road. This creates a safety hazard. If possible, wait until the road has been plowed before cleaning out the end of your driveway. There is no practical way to plow the road without depositing snow into your driveway. Township snow removal crews do not clear private driveways or driveway entrances of accumulated snow.



Cul-de-sacs are difficult to clear to everyone's satisfaction. Snowplows do not have the ability to lift and carry snow from one area to another. The plow pushes the snow. The driver pushes the snow to an area most suitable to expedite the plowing and to open the road for the majority of residents. The Road Department will return to cul-de-sac areas for more thorough clearing after all roads have been properly plowed and treated.



Mailboxes and posts are often broken from the weight of the plowed snow or simply pushed over by snow. Please check posts for deterioration to reduce the possibility of breakage. Also, install mailboxes as far from the edge of the roadway as permitted by your postal delivery personnel. Installations in the right of way are placed there at the owner's risk.



Do not drive unnecessarily in a storm, especially during severe snowstorms and freezing rains. If you do drive, be sure to properly clean your windshield and have winter wiper blades. Verify that your tires are properly inflated and have sufficient tread.



Please remove vehicles from the street during any snow event that requires plowing or the application of salt or anti-skid. There is reduced visibility for the drivers during snow storms or at night. Maneuvering a plow truck through parked traffic makes the job of the plow truck driver much more difficult.

Water Service During Vacation and Winter Get Away

Going away for an extended period of time?

The Brighton Township Municipal Authority offers a service to have your water service terminated at the curb stop for persons whose home may be vacant for an extended period of time. A service fee of \$10 is charged for both the turn-off and turn-on; a total of \$20. No charges accrue to your account during the period of termination. Accounts turned off prior to the 15th of the month will receive a ½ month's charge, and after the 15th will receive a full months charge.

- A person must be present within the home when the service is turned back on during normal work hours Monday through Friday.
- Provide a 24-hour notice of your return to schedule the water turn-on to be certain staff is available.
- You will need to call the Authority Office to schedule an appointment for this service.

Another option is that you can shut off the Stop and Waste Valve which is near the water meter in your home. If the home is vacant for an extended period this will help prevent significant flooding within the home should there be a plumbing failure while the home is vacant. However, unless service is terminated at the curb, monthly billings and charges will continue to accrue during the vacancy.

Recycling Correctly


Brighton Township's contracted refuse and recycling collection contractor, J. Young Refuse, delivers the collected recycling materials to a Waste Management facility for processing. Since the contract effective date of July 1, 2015, the facility has implemented three (3) rate increases for the delivery of recycled materials. More recently, the recycling facility has established a listing of surcharges that apply to loads of recycling materials that are contaminated with unacceptable items. Therefore, it is important to properly prepare your materials for recycling in accordance with the instructions.

Some of the most common recycling errors to avoid:

- Do not bag the recycling – the plastic bags get tangled in the machinery.
- Do not include food soiled items – they can turn a load into trash.
- Do not include wires or rubber hoses – they can shut down production.
- Cups with plastic or wax coatings are not recyclable – do not include.
- Polystyrene foam and plastic “to-go” containers are not recyclable – do not include.

How to Prepare Your Materials

EFFECTIVE MARCH 1, 2019



Plastic Bottles and Jugs Only

- All containers labeled # 1-5 and 7 are accepted!
- Rinse, flatten and securely fasten cap back on.
- Labels do not need to be removed.
- Containers that originally held oil or chemicals must be completely emptied and not contain any potentially hazardous material.
- No plastic bags or buckets.
- Place in green recycling container with other recycling items.

- Cereal and cracker type boxes can be included – remove inner bags or liners and flatten.
- Place directly in green recycling container with other recycling items.

Remember...

- Glass is NO LONGER accepted for recycling.
- Place your recycling container at roadside on the same day as your regular garbage collection during the recycling weeks.
- Place recyclables directly into recycling container. Do not place items in separate bags or they will not be collected.
- Recover your recycling container promptly after collection.
- Green recycling containers are available for purchase at the Brighton Township Municipal Building, 1300 Brighton Road.

Beaver County Hosts Household Chemical Collection

The Beaver County Recycling Center, located in Brady's Run Park, is hosting a Household Chemical Collection on Saturday, October 12th from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The fee for collection is \$3/gallon – Cash Only.

Acceptable items include aerosol cans, automotive fluids, batteries, chemistry sets, compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs), gasoline and kerosene, household cleaners, mercury, paint products (including sealers, thinners and strippers), pesticides/herbicides, photo and pool chemicals. Leaking containers will not be accepted.

The following is a partial list of what is not accepted: ammunition, appliances, bulk waste, electronics, TVs, drugs, explosives, fluorescent tubes, tires, explosives, medical waste (including needles) and other non-listed items.

What Not to Do!

- Never place these items into the sanitary sewers (sinks & toilets).

2019 Tire Disposal Date Set for September 28th

The Township's annual Tire Collection program conducted in cooperation with the Independence Conservancy has been scheduled. Tires are excluded from the curbside refuse collection program. Over the past two years nearly 1,000 tires have been collected at the Brighton Township site. These are tires that may have otherwise been improperly disposed of.

This year's collection will be Saturday, September 28th from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon at the Public Works site, 1250 Brighton Road. The fees are as follows:

Size:

Passenger car, light truck or motorcycle up to 18" off rim	\$ 3 ea.
Passenger car, light truck or motorcycle up to 18" on rim	\$ 5 ea.
Passenger car, light truck or motorcycle over 18" off rim	\$ 5 ea.
Tractor trailer up to 22.5" (no rims please)	\$ 25 ea.
Farm tractor up to 75 lbs. (no rims please)	\$ 25 ea.
Farm tractor 76 - 150 lbs. (no rims please)	\$ 40 ea.
Farm tractor over 150 lbs. (no rims please)	\$ 75 ea.

You can pay with cash or check (bring proper ID). The collection is provided for individuals and small businesses, and there is no limit to the number of tires you may bring. Proof of residency is not required.
